Addendum:

Of our 26 employees, 23 were born in Australia, 1 was born in England, 1 in Singapore, and 1 in Malaysia. None of our workforce identifies as Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander.

In November 2022, data was collected from parents, students, and staff as part of our Strategic Planning. The results are summarised below. Interestingly, there was a lot of cohesion across the different groups. Parents, staff and students were very satisfied with:

- Christian ethos and discipleship in the school
- Lack of bullying
- Caring, dedicated, and skilled staff
- Outdoor learning opportunities
- Individualised learning and holistic approach
- Affordability
- Smaller class sizes
- Strong sense of community

They were less satisfied with:

- The standards and academic rigour in the High School
- Communication
- Low numbers of students in the High School.
